This amendment is by and between the State of Minnesota, through its Commissioner of Natural Resources, Division of Ecological and Water Resources, and Minnesota's Lake Superior Coastal Program ("STATE") and City of Duluth, 411 West First Street, Duluth MN 55802 ("GRANTEE").

# Recitals

- 1. Under Coastal Zone Management Administration Awards, U.S. Department of Commerce; National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, CFDA 11.419, NA22NOS4190054, the State received a federal award on July 1, 2022 for Implementation of Minnesota's Lake Superior Coastal Program (Revised Attachment A.1, attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement).
- 2. The State has a grant contract with the Grantee identified as 216874 to provide services for Minnesota's Lake Superior Coastal Program's FFY22 Task 306A-2: Minnesota Point Boardwalk and Dune Restoration.
- 3. The Grantee has submitted sufficient documentation to satisfy the requirements for National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and environmental consultation; and has received approval from NOAA and the State to expend funds for construction of the boardwalk and dune restoration.
- 4. The State and Grantee have agreed that additional time will be necessary for the satisfactory completion of the agreement.
- 5. City of Duluth Resolution 23-##### (Attachment F, attached and incorporated into this grant contract) empowers the Grantee to enter into this grant contract amendment.
- 6. The State and the Grantee are willing to amend the original grant contract as stated below.

# **Grant Contract Amendment**

REVISION 2. Clause 2. "Grantee's Duties" is amended as follows:

#### 2. Grantee's Duties

The Grantee, who is not a state employee, will:

- a) Comply with required grants management policies and procedures set forth through Minn.Stat. § 16B.97, Subd.4(a)(1).
- b) Perform the duties specified in the Project Description and Budget (Revised Attachment B.<u>12</u>, attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement).
- c) Complete the project within the time frame specified and in accordance with the approved budget in the grant contract agreement. Any material change in the grant contract agreement will require an amendment by the State (see Section 7.2).
- d) Be responsible for the administration, supervision, management, record keeping, and project oversight required for the work performed under this agreement.

- e) Maintain a written conflict of interest policy (Attachment C, attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement). Throughout the term of this agreement, the Grantee must monitor and disclose any actual or potential conflicts of interest to the State's Authorized Representative.
- f) Ensure that all work be conducted in accordance with appropriate Federal, Tribal, state, and local laws and will follow recognized best practices for minimizing impacts to the human and natural environment. REVISION 3. Clause 4.1. "Consideration." is amended as follows:
- 4.1. **Consideration.** The State will pay for all services performed by Grantee under this grant contract agreement as follows:
  - (A) **Compensation.** The Grantee will be paid \$108,182.00 according to the breakdown of costs contained in Revised Attachment B.\(\frac{1}{2}\).
  - (B) **Travel Expenses.** Reimbursement for travel and subsistence expenses actually and necessarily incurred by the Grantee as a result of this grant contract agreement will not exceed \$0.00. The State will reimburse the Grantee for travel and subsistence expenses in the same manner and in no greater amount than provided in the current "Commissioner's Plan" promulgated by the Commissioner of Minnesota Management and Budget (MMB). The State will not reimburse for travel and subsistence expenses incurred outside Minnesota unless the Grantee has received the State's prior written approval for out of state travel.
  - (C) **Total Obligation.** The total obligation of the State for all compensation and reimbursements to the Grantee under this grant contract agreement will not exceed \$108,182.00.
  - (D) Specific award conditions. Task 306A-2, Minnesota Point Boardwalk and Dune Restoration was not sufficiently defined for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to perform an environmental review. The Grantee is not authorized to expend any funds for construction of the boardwalks or dune restoration. until the Grantee provides to the State: a 306A checklist; budgets; site plans; information on location, methods, and best management practices being used; any additional information requested to satisfy requirements for National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and environmental consultation; and receives approval from the State. Once approved, the Grantee is authorized to expend these funds, unless there are other conditions placed on the award that would restrict this expenditure of funds. Non-field activities as described in Task Outcome 1 (\$5,000) in Attachment B may proceed in advance of this approval.

The State and NOAA, Office for Coastal Management have reviewed and approved the project methods (Attachment E, attached and incorporated into this grant contract). The Grantee is authorized to expend funds for construction of the boardwalk and dune restoration at Lafayette Community Center. The Grantee must submit any changes to these methods to the State's Authorized Representative prior to construction.

The City is granted additional funds to complete a Phase 1 Archeological Survey (\$3,887) for the Area of Potential Effect and to compensate Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa for Tribal Monitors (\$4,295) to be onsite during shovel tests for the Survey as well as the ground disturbing activities during construction for the boardwalk at Lafayette.

(E) **Indirect Cost Rate.** The federal indirect cost rate for the State's federal award is 20.20%. The Grantee's indirect cost rate is 0% for this sub-award agreement. The State will accept the

- indirect cost rate negotiated with a federal agency, provided the agency approved the rate on or before the award end date.
- (F) Matching Requirements. The total project cost is \$214,258.00. Grantee will provide \$106,076.00 or 50% of project-related costs from non-federal sources, whichever is less.
- Budget Changes. The Grantee is required to report deviations from the approved award budget. (G) The Grantee may not create new budget categories without written approval. The Grantee must request approval for a budget change when the cumulative amount transfers exceed or is expected to exceed 10 percent of the total budget as last approved by the State.

REVISION 4. Clause 18.3. "Final Report." is amended as follows:

Final Report. The Grantee must submit a Final Report, which summarizes activities conducted during the entire award, and Products, as identified in Revised Attachment B.12, within thirty days of expiration (see Section 1).

Justification					
The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is requesting an 18-month, no cost extension to its NA22 award (new expiration date: June 30, 2025). We need this extension to fulfill elements of two tasks.					
The City of Duluth is working diligently with us in completing the necessary environmental review for their boardwalk project (Task 306A-2). They recently completed a Phase I archeological survey. NOAA will use this information to continue their pending consultations with the State Historic Preservation Office and Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa's Tribal Historic Preservation Officer. Until then, the project is on hold. Given we are into August with Minnesota's construction window closing in October, we don't anticipate the City of Duluth being able to finish the construction this year. With this extension, they would have the full spring/summer 2024 season to replace the boardwalk and restore adjacent dune habitat.					
In addition, we still have the majority of our small, capacity building funds to distribute (Task 306-6, Outcome 2). Capacity needs are acute in our coastal zone, so keeping this opportunity open for as long as possible is of utmost importance to the program.

Task 306A-2: Minnesota Point Boardwalk and Dune Restoration

Minnesota Point in Duluth Minnesota is a unique and fragile environment. It is the only sandy beach and dunes on Lake Superior in Minnesota. On the dunes, vegetation is beachgrass and a patchy cover of shrubs, forbs, graminoids, and fruticose lichens. These species, including the beachgrass, only grow on Minnesota Point. People walking across the dunes disturb this fragile vegetation.

City of Duluth (subrecipient) will replace two deteriorated boardwalks that provide beach access across the Minnesota Point sand dunes in two locations: Lafayette Community Center and Park Point. The boardwalks, built to Americans with Disability Act standards, will provide access from the adjoining parking lots to the beach.

The City will replace the boardwalks with salvaged Ipe lumber re-claimed from the City's Lakewalk reconstruction projects. Ipe is a Brazilian Hardwood with an approximate 100-year life expectancy. It is naturally resistant to bugs, mold, and mildew as well as exceeds the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements for slip resistance when wet. The salvaged Ipe lumber is approximately 35 years old.

The finished boardwalks will include railings on both sides. After installed it will be covered with a UV Finisher specifically made for hardwood.

After completed, the City will close the social trails and replant with beachgrass. The beachgrass disturbed before and during construction will be replanted on the social trails. The City will install signage to direct users to the official dune crossings.

The City, with the DNR, will submit the 306A Questionnaire with supporting documentation for the boardwalk at Lafayette after completing the engineering designs in Outcome 1.

### **Task Outcomes**

1. **Engineering Designs** - Complete engineering designs for the Park Point Recreation Area boardwalk.

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Outcome End Date: December 2022

2. **Construct Boardwalk** - Using salvaged lumber, construct boardwalk at Lafayette Community Center. Boardwalk will extend from parking area to the beach, and include railings and signage.

Outcome End Date: November 2023 December 2024

3. **Replant vegetation** - Restore the disturbed beachgrass and other native vegetation on the social trails.

Outcome End Date: November 2023 December 2024

4. **Phase 1 Archeological Survey** - Complete a Phase 1 Archeological Survey at in the Area of Potential Effects at Lafayette Community Center.

City of Duluth (City; subrecipient) will replace the deteriorated boardwalk that across the Minnesota Point sand dunes at the Lafayette Community Center. Minnesota Point is an important ecological landscape, and the only sand beach on Lake Superior in Minnesota. This project both provides public access and protects an important coastal habitat (beach grass).

The City will construct the new boardwalk to Architectural Barriers Act standards. The finished boardwalk will include railings on both sides and the wood will be treated with a UV Finisher specifically made for hardwood. After the new boardwalk is in place, the City will close the social trails and contract with professionals to replant with beachgrass. The beachgrass disturbed before and during construction will also be replanted. The City will install signage to direct users to the official dune crossings.

Prior to onsite activities, the City must have the frames constructed and prepare the wood.

The boardwalk, built to Architectural Barriers Act standards, will provide access from the adjoining parking lots to the beach. The finished boardwalk will include railings on both sides and be treated with a UV Finisher specifically made for hardwood. After completion, the City will close the social trails and replant with beachgrass. The beachgrass disturbed before and during construction will be replanted. The City will install signage to direct users to the official dune crossings.
    - Objective 1: Replace the degraded boardwalk and railing that protect the dune environment and provide safe accessible beach access.
    - Objective 2: Eliminate social trails and replant with native beachgrass.
    - Goal: Protect the dune ecosystem on Minnesota Point.

The designated dune crossing has been in place for several years and are effective at protecting the fragile dune environment in a location that sees significantly heavy public use.

Demolition utilizes a mixture of mechanized and hand labor. Mechanized trail work is done with equipment such as tracked dozers, excavators, and tracked haulers. Typically tracked machines are utilized because their lower ground pressure reduces compaction. Stabilization with beachgrass follows the final restoration and is planted by hand.

Construction access will be from either the beach side or Lake Ave, preventing any heavy equipment impacts to the dunes. The boardwalk will be constructed off site in sections and assembled at the site. The boardwalk will be constructed of re-claimed Ipe, the hardest of Brazilian Hardwoods. It is approximately 3 times harder than Oak with an approximate 100-year life expectancy. The salvaged Ipe lumber is approximately 35 years old, leaving a substantial portion of its useful life remaining. Ipe is naturally resistant to bugs, mold, and mildew due to its density and hardness (Janka Scale 3680). The City will apply a UV Finisher specifically made for Hardwood to ensure it will last for years to come.

The piping Plover is Endangered in Minnesota and Wisconsin as well as federally.

The Lafayette Community Center is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, there is a Historical/Architectural Survey for the property (2013). This was sent to the NOAA for a low-cost construction project that altered the building (NA16NOS4190119; Task 306A-1). As this project will not impact the building itself, we have not submitted it with this questionnaire packet.






# **Project Location Map**

Jim, Thank you so much for this graphic! This really does help. Just so you know what we (Clinton Little and myself) do with these searches: we take your excel spreadsheet and map the addresses (see attached). We send both the spreadsheet and the map to NOAA who will initiate the formal consultation with SHPO. Our map is just to help with NOAA's initial review and consultation request to you (SHPO).

While we couldn't find 3101 Lake Avenue South via our usual address mapping methods, we were able to dig in and find the property, verified through the parcel data. It's interesting, even though there is not a street there (i.e., Lake Ave) the houses closest the lake still have Lake Avenue addresses!

However, we are stuck with the 321 Minnesota Avenue property. In your picture, it looks like it should be across the street and to the west just a couple of houses? Is it possible you can send us the geospatial data for that property? Or send that graphic/map without the highlighted dots on it? That way we can add the labels, a project location marker, and send it to NOAA. If not, we'll find a work around (we'll send the graphic, with a note).

Knowing you have the geodata, is it possible in the future you could send the GIS coordinates in the excel file? That would make mapping it easier. I understand if you can't, but thought I'd ask regardless.

I greatly appreciate your help with this! I know you are really busy, so I appreciate you carving out the time to help us put this together. It was fun to dig into and find out more about Minnesota Point. That area really is full of history (and constantly changing due to the lake).
